Subject contents	Greek philosophy as a model for all subsequent philosophy. Natural philosophy, the Sophistic schools, and Socrates. The second voyage and the controversies surrounding Plato and his philosophy. Socrates' other students, the so-called Minor Socratics. Fundamental themes in Aristotle's philosophy and the changing perception of the role of sophie in the Hellenistic era. The great philosophical schools: the Cynics, Stoics, Epicureans, and Skeptics, as well as the early sages of Christianity. The compact, temporally and spatially defined format of the classes aims to develop the ability to perceive philosophical issues in their variability, interdependence, and evolution.
