Cosmology, mythology, demonology of Hinduism. Yoga. Jainism. Sikhism. Buddhism (various streams of Buddhism, teachings of the historical Buddha, discussion of selected Buddhist sutras, Mahayana, Hinayana and Vajrayana Buddhism). Historical Buddhist schools (tiantai, pure land school), tantric Buddhism. The peculiarities of Tibetan Buddhism (ningma, sakya, karma kagyu and gelug schools), khan Buddhism (Bodhidharma teachings, khan classical period, selected khan schools). Zen Buddhism.
