Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to familiarize participants with the main issues related to Japanese aesthetics. The following issues will be discussed: elements shaping and characterizing Japanese culture, perception of nature and cultural landscape, including traditional perception of nature, rice fields, key elements of the landscape and their experience, famous meisho views, the concept of fūdo. In addition, aesthetic ideals in Japanese culture (the concept of beauty, the formation of the concept of beauty, key features and aesthetic concepts, Japanese design katsura, shibui, wabi-sabi, iki, miyabi, karei, ma, mingei, etc.) as well as tradition and contemporary influences on life with the goal of ikigai, lifelong friendships moai, ojigi, the concept of the face menboku, appreciating the moment ichi-go ichi-e; manifestations of aesthetics in everyday life. The topic will be supplemented by a discussion of Japanese architecture, including railway stations and railways in Japan.
