Subject contents	The course focuses on the following issues: the transformation of Japanese society from a pre-industrial to an industrial and later post-industrial society; the construction of a modern state during the Meiji period; the development of a unified national identity; Japans military expansion; governance of colonies and annexed territories; the rise of radical political movements in the interwar period; World War II; social life under conditions of total mobilization; democratization and reforms under American occupation; the emergence of a consumer society during the period of rapid economic growth in the second half of the 20th century; Japans foreign policy during the Cold War; economic stagnation since the 1990s and its social consequences; and key problems and challenges facing contemporary Japanese politics (demographics, territorial disputes, national defense, historical policy).
