Subject contents	This course explores contemporary literature from Africa and the West Indies written in English, focusing on works from the 20th century to the present. Through novels, short stories, poetry, and drama, students will examine how writers from these regions address themes such as colonialism and its aftermath, identity, migration, language, gender, memory, and resistance. The course emphasises the rich diversity of cultural, political, and historical contexts that shape these literatures, while also highlighting common threads that link African and Caribbean literary traditions. Writers may include Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o, Tsitsi Dangarembga, Derek Walcott, Jean Rhys, V.S. Naipaul, Jamaica Kincaid, and Kei Miller, among others. Through close reading, critical analysis, and class discussion, students will gain a deeper understanding of how contemporary African and West Indian writers use English to challenge dominant narratives and express distinct cultural identities.
