Subject contents	Aufklärung: periodisation; comparison with the Baroque; major philosophical currents (rationalism, empiricism) and the development of the natural sciences; religious contexts of the Enlightenment (deism, pietism, physico-theology). Poetics and aesthetics of the Enlightenment (Gottsched, Bodmer, Breitinger; Baumgarten, Lessing, Kant). Literary forms and genres: lyric poetry (Brockes, Haller, Klopstock), drama (theatre reform, bourgeois tragedy, comedy), development of the eighteenth-century novel. Authors: Klopstock, Lessing, Wieland. Sturm und Drang: the concept of genius, the influence of Rousseau, the cult of Shakespeare; nature and culture; concepts of language. Authors: Herder, the early works of Goethe (<i>Götz von Berlichingen, Die Leiden des jungen Werthers</i>), the Hainbund, early works of Schiller (<i>Die Räuber, Kabale und Liebe</i>). Weimarer Klassik: ideals of harmony and classical humanism. Authors: Goethe (<i>Iphigenie, Torquato Tasso, Wilhelm Meister, Faust</i>) and Schiller (<i>Don Carlos, Maria Stuart, Wallenstein, Wilhelm Tell</i>). Romantik: Frühromantik (the Schlegel brothers, Tieck, Novalis); transitional figures between Classicism and Romanticism (Jean Paul, Hölderlin, Kleist); Heidelberger Romantik (Brentano, Arnim); Eichendorff, E. T. A. Hoffmann; patriotic lyric poetry and <i>Polenlieder</i>. Biedermeier and the Vormärz period: Stifter, Grillparzer, Droste-Hülshoff, Mörike, Heine; Junges Deutschland; Büchner (<i>Dantons Tod, Woyzeck</i>); political poetry of the Vormärz. Poetischer Realismus: Storm, Keller, Meyer, Hebbel, Fontane. Naturalismus and the beginnings of modernism: Hauptmann, Arno Holz, Johannes Schlaf.
