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Prerequisites and co-requisites	1. Attendance. You can miss two meetings without any consequences having to explain the reasons for your absence. In the case of the third and subsequent ones absences, passing the classes is required (at your discretion - oral or answer written during the consultation). Activity during classes related to: speaking up during discussions on analyzed scientific texts, andjournalistic materials. 2. Preparation for classes. Each participant is obliged to read the texts assigned to given classes (both the basic literature included in the syllabus and additional literature readings recommended a week in advance). They will form the basis for group tasks during classes and discussions on selected problems. Leader reserves the right to check knowledge of the readings (so-called "passes"; they are not available pass is equivalent to an absence). 3. Final work. Each course participant is obliged to prepare and present during designated classes, a presentation about one of the most recent phenomena environment that interests him and can be included in one of the topics discussed on classes. This presentation should be an attempt to interpret social lifesociological language, with particular emphasis on the use of conceptsused in classes. It is important that it involves obtaining information about it phenomenon using basic tools - analysis of existing data (mainly all using what has already been written on this topic or using as inspiration for cultural works), but also the opportunity to talk to the person(s) who have...a given topic something important to say. 4. Formal framework. The speech should not be longer than 15 minutes and should include a presentation multimedia forming the basis for it (no more than 10 slides). It should be implemented according to the following scheme: • I. Inspiration to tackle the topic • II. Description of the phenomenon from a sociological perspective with marked references to literature [concepts, typologies, descriptions] • III. Sources of information about the phenomenon • IV. Reflection on the result confrontation of intuition before starting the project with the effect of describing the topic with sociological perspective. Each presentation will be discussed.
