Subject contents	1. Anthropology "at home": its definition, characteristics, and how it differs from classical anthropology. Poland/world perspective. 2. Globalization, glocalization, creolization, indigenization: meanings of these concepts, examples, discussion around the shape of globalization (two opposing scenarios). 3. Tradition and cultural heritage in the "post-traditional" world. The concept of "invented tradition". Work of heritage, tangible and intangible heritage. 4. Anthropology of contemporary nationalism: national identity and everyday life. 5. Migrations: from questions about integration (discussion) to transnational life, settlement, and mobility as anthropological "lenses". 6. Transnationalism of migrants, transmigration and economics, transnational migrations and reinterpretation of family, transmigrations and cultural diffusion (social transfers), types of transnationalism. 7. The concept of neoliberalism, neoliberalism in anthropological/ethnographic research. 8. Faces of economic and social transformation in the Eastern Bloc (1990s) and ethnographic knowledge. The concept of postsocialism - its ambiguity and discussion around it. 9. Using a postcolonial perspective in research on Central and Eastern Europe. 10. Anthropology of food systems' change.
