Subject objectives	This course will discuss formative documents, concepts, and metaphors, specific to American culture, such as the idea of American exceptionalism, the pursuit of happiness, civil disobedience, thanksgiving, immigration and the melting pot, race, migrations, and cultural diversity. It will focus on the rhetoric of formative documents, such as the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States with the amendments, and the Gettysburg Address. We will discuss the politics of multiculturalism, minority cultures, womens rights, social activism, and ecology.

Subject contents	The seminar presents topics selected by the instructor on the historical and cultural contexts of British literature, for example: Demographic characteristics of the United States; colonization and competition for influence; taxation and smuggling; motivation of colonists to fight for independence. Formative documents: Jefferson's Declaration of Independence; the rhetorical structure of the document and its growing importance in the US history. Formative documents: The U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights - how to create a modern state from scratch. Native Americans, early trade relations, eastward expansion, unfulfilled promises and broken treaties, reservations and land division, forced assimilation and schooling, contemporary relations with tribes. Concepts shaping the American culture from the colonial period to the present. The formation of the political system and American institutions. Exceptionalism and individualism. Henry David Thoreau and the concept of civil disobedience. The Civil War 1860-1865, its causes and consequences; slavery, abolitionism; the meaning and practical applications of the 13th and 14th Amendments to the Constitution; Formative documents: Abraham Lincoln, "Gettysburg Address"; respect for those who lost the battle as a basis for reuniting the country. The suffrage movement, the women's right to control the money they earn, and access to education; 19th Amendment to the Constitution of United States. History of health care in the U.S., privatization of medical insurance, Medicaid, Medicare and Obamacare. Migration and the concept of Thanksgiving; state and federal regulations on migration. The conservation movement and the first national parks; federal laws on environmental protection. Formative documents: Theodore Roosevelt and the "Infamy Speech" following the attack on Pearl Harbor; the war discourse and American isolationism. Rise of the Second Amendment, its interpretation; widespread access to guns; assassinations and mass shootings in a variety of public places. Media and current American cultural phenomena; significant social movements: Rosa Parks and Montgomery Bus Boycott; Martin Luther King and protests in Birmingham; March on Washington and "I Have a Dream" speech. Use of contemporary media by the civil rights movement in the 1960s (television and the modern sound system at the March on Washington); basic laws limiting racial discrimination passed in the 1960s. Multiculturalism and minority cultures; the conservative argument for marriage equality; partnership rights in individual states up to the 2015 federal law.
