Subject contents	Introduction to the history of literary translation: ancient writers (with particular emphasis on St Jerome and biblical translations); an overview of the history of translation in English literature (Chaucer, Wycliff, North, Chapman, Pound, Rieu and others); Shakespearean translations in Polish; problems of literary translation; elements of literary translation theory; analysis of the translator's work on the example of Stanisław Barańczak's achievements; translation exercises: English and Polish texts (analysis, translation and discussion of translations of selected literary texts, e.g. Alice in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll, The Hobbit by J.R.R. Tolkien, nonsense poetry, song lyrics, detective and humorous prose).
