Grammaticalization and its examples in German. 4. Linguistic contacts in lexis and linguistic purism in the history of German. From the history of orthography and orthophony. 5. Lower German as the language of the Hanseatic League. Eastern colonization and its dialects. Elements of the linguistic history of Danzig and Pomerania from the 12th to the 19th century. 6. Selected historical typefaces.
