Subject contents	Exercise topics in semester 4 - grammar: Ukrainian alphabet, phonetic phenomena, peculiarities of sound pronunciation; conjugation of nouns, adjectives, cardinal and ordinal numbers, personal and possessive pronouns; adverb and preposition; present, past and future tenses of verbs; syntax of single and complex sentences; declarative, interrogative utterance; orthoepic and intonational correctness. Oral and written statements (dialogue, description). Basic rules of spelling. Introducing thematic vocabulary, e.g. greetings, farewells, polite phrases, thanks, apologies; making friends; interrogative phrases, confirmation, expressions of consent, denial, refusal, expressions of satisfaction; expressing wishes and greetings; time, names of days of the week, month, season; weather and natural phenomena; address, place of residence; personal data, age determination; profession, occupation, place of work; education and work; information about yourself, your family, acquaintances, friends; appearance, clothing; Morning Toilet; shopping; ways of spending free time; disease; holidays, traditions and customs in Ukraine. Additional literary texts adapted to thematic circles; Ukrainian folk tales and Ukrainian songs. Constant contact with Ukrainian news by reading contemporary texts and TV programs, as well as getting acquainted with the tradition and culture of Ukraine.
