Subject objectives	<p>The student learns in the course of lecture and exercises the practical sense and dogmatic construction of the discussed institutions of Roman private law, as well as basic knowledge of their influence on the development of private law in modern times. He acquires basic information about the method of developing law in ancient Rome and the influence of Roman texts on the construction of the science of law in medieval and modern Europe. The indicated scope of knowledge of Roman law should facilitate the student's understanding of the nature of concepts and institutions of modern private law, growing out of the tradition of Roman law. The student also acquires the ability to use this legal tradition as a criterion for comparing different private law systems and to independently assess the evolution of modern private law and development.</p>
