Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to familiarize students with the fundamental principles of a democratic state governed by the rule of law and with the functioning of contemporary political systems in the context of transformations resulting from the development of the information society. During the course, students will become acquainted with the significance of constitutional principles of the rule of law, the mechanisms of operation of public institutions, and the impact of modern information technologies on political, administrative, and legal processes. The course also aims to develop students ability to analyze contemporary challenges to democracy, such as the digitalization of public administration, access to public information, the protection of civil rights in the digital environment, and the role of new media in democratic processes.
