<b>Subject objectives</b>	The aim of the lecture is to present the basic artistic and cultural phenomena of antiquity, broadly defined, and to familiarize students with the most important achievements in architecture, sculpture, painting, and decorative arts of prehistoric and ancient historical cultures of the Mediterranean basin. Furthermore, it aims to develop the ability to independently analyze and evaluate the presented phenomena.

<b>Subject contents</b>	The lecture consists of four broad thematic blocks devoted to the art of the ancient Near East, Egypt, Greece, and Rome, supplemented by three smaller blocks dealing with prehistoric culture and art, the Bronze Age Aegean world, and Etruria. Due to the extensive scope of the material, key works of art (architecture, sculpture, painting, and decorative arts) are presented chronologically. In addition to presenting the core issues and monuments most important from the perspective of contemporary art history, special emphasis is placed on the processes and works of greatest significance for the development of late antique art. Beyond providing basic factual information on the topics discussed, the lectures aim to highlight the persistence of ancient traditions in the art of later periods, in terms of formal, iconographic, and ideological references.
