Subject contents	<p>The classes focus on selected issues in medieval art, including the emergence and phases of major stylistic formations Romanesque and Gothic, the role of monasteries, courts, and cities in the development of art, the relationship between artist and patron, the function of models in the creative process, the transmission of artistic patterns, and the altarpiece: its types and evolution. The classes also aim to develop students ability to work independently with scholarly texts and to present their findings during class sessions.</p> <p>As part of the tutorials, each student is required to deliver one presentation based on a foreign-language scholarly text and to successfully pass visual colloquia.</p>
