Subject contents	The aim of the course is to introduce students to the theoretical assumptions and the practical dimension of the main theories of international relations and the works of its authors. To reflect on the usefulness of the theory of international relations and their application. The course covers also the basic concepts and terms necessary to describe and explain models of political power structures, analyze the processes of selecting and creating political actors and knowledge about the main elite theories. The course participants will also analyze the phenomenon of violence in politics. The idea of violence will be reconstructed and redefined. Participants will learn about basic methods and strategies of violence usage by state and non-state actors. Issues related to migration will also be an important block of issues discussed
