It encompasses the following specific objectives : methodological preparation , understood as learning the principles of conducting research, using literature, citing sources, and formulating hypotheses and research theses; substantive preparation , understood as deepening knowledge in a selected area of tax law; analytical preparation , understood as developing the ability to critically analyse legal acts, case law, and subject literature; editorial preparation , understood as developing skills in structuring the thesis, maintaining academic style, and editing the text; as well as self-presentational preparation for the public defence of the thesis, answering questions, and academic discussion.
