Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to introduce students to the legal frameworks governing waste management within the European Union and in transboundary contexts. The course explores the key principles, instruments and institutions involved in EU waste law, as well as the rules applicable to the cross-border movement of waste. Particular emphasis is placed on the preventive and integrated approach to waste management, the responsibilities of public administration and economic operators, and the alignment of national systems with EU environmental objectives, including the circular economy and the European Green Deal.
