Subject contents	Historical grammar of the Russian language as a science. Periods of development of the Russian language. SCS language and its influence on the development of the Russian language. The beginnings of the linguistic culture of the Eastern Slavs: the disintegration of the Proto-Slavic linguistic community and the emergence of three sets of Slavic languages. The mission of Cyril and Methodius. Glagolitic and Cyrillic. Important manuscripts of the SCS and Old Russian languages. Exterior of texts - material, ornamentation, types of writing; appearance of printing and first printed texts; reforms of [ortho]graphy. The main developmental laws of the pre-Slavic language. The origin and development of Old Slavic vowels: jusy. Their fate in the East Slavic vocalic system. The origin and development of Old Slavic vowels: yers. Their fate in the East Slavic vocalic system. The law of the open syllable and the development of groups like *tort, *tolt, *tert, *telt. The law of syllable synchrony and the 1, 2 and 3 palatalization of back-language consonants. Simplification of consonant groups. Consonant changes induced by the neighborhood of j. Nouns in SCS and Old Russian. The fate of declensions. Pronouns in SCS and Old Russian. Development of demonstrative pronouns. Adjectives in SCS and Old Russian. Short and full forms. The numeral in SCS and Old Russian. The tense system in SCS and Old Russian: aorist, imperfectum, perfectum, pluquamperfectum. Forms of future tense. Commanding mode.		
Prerequisites and co-requisites	The prerequisite for taking the course is passing the introduction to linguistics in semester 1 and passing the exam on descriptive grammar of Russian in semester 2. Knowledge of the Russian language at a level to achieve the established learning outcomes, the basics of linguistics and descriptive grammar of the Russian language, unless in special cases the instructor decides otherwise.
