Subject contents	(two modules from the following) (1) Game localization This course is designed to introduce students to the basics of video game localization. In the course, students will learn about game localization guidelines and industry standards, as well as the concept of multi-textuality and related translation approaches. As part of the course, students translate authentic game texts from each category using the appropriate approach and, perform proofreading in the forum. The course also includes evaluating the quality of the translation in accordance with industry practice. (2) Career path in translation The course covers practical information on the current market situation in the specialized translation business. The participants will learn how to, among other things, promote their own business, acquire clients, get commissions, and effectively use translation and proofreading tools. (3) Business translation The aim of the course is to familiarize students with basic business terminology and documents used in business transactions. Texts to be translated will include business offers, financial documents, business plans and marketing plans, as well as other texts most often commissioned by companies for translation (such as those on human resource management and real estate). Later in the course, students will translate financial statements (balance sheets, profit and loss statements, cash flow statements), annual reports, auditor's reports and opinions, as well as press releases. (4) Translating non-fiction The goal of this class is to familiarize students with the basic tools and strategies for translating non-fiction in the English-Polish language pair. In the course, students translate excerpts from biographies, travel guides, interviews, newspaper articles, blog posts and essays. The emphasis is both on maintaining factual accuracy, which includes the use of correct terminology, and on stylistic equivalence, i.e. the translator's ability to select the appropriate register and tone depending on the type of text. One of the goals of the course is also to draw students' attention to the importance of linguistic norms, especially in terms of the target language grammar, collocation, punctuation, etc. (5) Sight translation The course is designed to familiarize students with a vista interpreting techniques (including as preparation for simultaneous interpreting). In the class, students have the opportunity to improve public speaking skills, develop linguistic flexibility, and expand terminology on important social and political phenomena. In addition, the course is designed to support the process of developing one's own tactics and strategies for dealing with translation challenges and the stress of public speaking. (6) Pharmaceutical translation The course offers an opportunity to develop the ability to consciously translate specialized pharmaceutical texts in Polish-English language combination, taking into account their terminological and formal specificities and market requirements; to sensitize the student to the importance of studying the context of the source text and conducting a comparative analysis of similar source texts and their translations. (7) Introduction to interpreting The course provides an introduction to conference interpreting, including techniques and strategies for consecutive, liaison and whispered interpreting. Students complete numerous practical exercises, implementing memory techniques and public speaking skills. Students search for and gather information on a given topic using computer-assisted interpreting tools, and critically evaluate the quality of interpreting attempts made during the course.
